Rev Ray Writes

This year at Christ Church we're going to make more of Advent! We're going to focus more on that four-week period of waiting which leads us to Christmas. We want to squeeze more value out of this time which is laden with symbolism. We want to encourage everyone in our congregation to look back on what God has done in the past. We want to encourage people to hold the brokenness of the world around us up to God in prayer. We want to help people to perceive what God is doing in our midst. And we want to encourage people to look forward to a hopeful future. All this perceiving needs us to STOP! Stop buying, cleaning, cooking, wrapping, inviting, phoning, messaging, googling, etc. etc. etc. Then, once we've stopped, we need to LOOK. And once we've looked, we need to SEE.

And what do I see right now? Well at the time of writing I see TV coverage of the Paris terrorist attacks. At first sight, the serene-looking nativity scenes on Christmas cards seem to be at odds with the horrific TV images of terrorist attacks worldwide (they're not just happening in Paris). But there is a link between the nativity scene and the TV coverage which is subtle yet powerful if we are willing to LOOK past the glitter, the tinsel and the incessant seasonal music playing in the shops. We have to SEE the real story behind the sanitised nativity scenes depicting a clean baby smiling at a well-dressed mother watched over by a smiling father, in a stable full of animals, shepherds and kings.

The Christmas story is, essentially, the story of vulnerable healing coming into the midst of brokenness. The world into which Jesus was born was troubled, unjust, unequal and broken. Indeed, the manner in which Jesus was conceived and born brought its own measure of trouble and brokenness. A conception wrought within a

teenage girl as yet unmarried, engaged to a good man who had to spend his adult married life in the shadow of something much bigger than himself and a child who would always upstage him. Because of this child, which wasn't his, Joseph would be hunted and become a refugee in Egypt. The child would court controversy and not be 'normal'. And on reflection, it seems to me that all of that is totally appropriate for a God who wants to share in our brokenness and bring hope to the world.

So what hope is there in the atrocities we see on our TV screens? What can we salvage from the wreckage that evil intent has left behind? The answer is vulnerable healing. Jesus came into the world as a vulnerable baby and worked his healing by going from person to person. Yes, he preached to thousands but his healing (physical, emotional and spiritual) was meted out person-to-person, one-byone. Jesus was not a superhero who stopped the villains' treachery. He worked on a personal level. And as I LOOK around me at that vulnerable healing spreading through people like you and me, I can SEE that the world is better in places. But we have a way to go. We have pockets of healing but we are still waiting for complete renewal. We are still in Advent. So, what are you waiting for?

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Music in the Afternoon

A 'Music in the Afternoon' concert held on September 6th at Christ Church has raised money for the ongoing aid needed in Nepal following the earthquakes in April and May.

Guest performers for the 10th in the series, Jane Pembleton-Smyth and Fenella Haworth-Head brought a varied programme of pieces ranging from Bach to 'Breakfast at Tiffany's'.

Jane, a flautist with 30 years' experience in teaching, has also performed in Master Classes and concerts around the North West and is a regular member of Preston Flute Group.

The first half featured the popular 'Badinerie' from Bach's Suite No 2 in B minor and Rimsky-Korsakov's 'Flight of the Bumble Bee'. Contrasting with these were delightful, lyrical pieces which demonstrated both Jane's technical expertise and her impressive breath control.

As well as playing pieces which demonstrated the virtuosic capabilities of the modern flute, Jane also played the Alto Flute. 'Le Chant du Vent' by Donjon demonstrated this lower pitched member of the flute family very well. In her very relaxed style, Jane presented the audience throughout with informative introductions about both the history of the flute and the music being played.

Fenella, like Jane, studied at the Royal Northern College of Music, graduating in 1987. A piano teacher by profession, she has regularly accompanied soloists all around the North West. She and Jane present themselves as a very successful partnership and perform together with a great passion giving careful attention to the demands of the music. Fenella chose a Grieg Notturno and Arabesque No I by Debussy for her solo performances. She showed great flair and musicality in her interpretation of these expressive pieces.

The programme moved on through Romantic styles into the 20th century with a mesmerising performance of Debussy's 'Syrinx', a Lament for a Fallen Wood Nymph. More modern film themes brought this most enjoyable concert to a close. These consisted of three of Henry Mancini's orchestral works, arranged for flute and piano by James Galway. Following appreciative applause, the audience was treated to yet another gentle, lyrical piece, 'Alone in the Rain' as an encore.

John Spencer took opportunity in the break, to give an insight into the ongoing work in Nepal in the aftermath of the devastating earthquakes and the need for continuing support of their established mission partners.

Ticket sales and donations amounted to £400 for Aid for Nepal through 'All We Can' (The Methodist Relief and Development Fund)

About once every two months, our church or Churches Together run a 'Coffee Day' at the Civic Hall. As hinted earlier, this is probably mis-named. It is important to Longridge to keep its little market but it would be in danger of disappearing, if there were to be no café on Thursdays. It is not possible to have a commercial café so the café is run by a range of local charities in turn. We still pay a rental but can keep any profits for church or our designated charities. This is a great way to be 'at the heart of the community' as our church motto says, but we are finding that we are fewer in number than we used to be and Pam would be really grateful for additional help in the kitchen and with a range of other tasks. early starters get to the Civic Hall before 8am to set up tables and transport the food, bric-a-brac and other equipment to the hall. From then on Toast and Marmalade and tea, coffee, cake and biscuits are served through the morning. At lunchtime, the staple is Pam's Hot Pot with mushy peas, red cabbage or pickled beetroot but there are also sandwiches made to order and pre-prepared hot and cold We would welcome help from men and women, young and a bit older, so please watch out for future dates and see Pam Cliff or any of her helpers if you could offer to help out in any way.

Good News

There is always so much bad news to report and we need to pray for refugees and those injured in senseless wars and atrocities as well as those bereaved by the crazy actions of a minority of deluded people. It is therefore good to bring some happy news for a change. The terrible scourge of Ebola in West Africa seems to be almost over. Liberia was declared free of Ebola some time ago. In early November, Sierra Leone was also declared free of the disease and today we heard that the last patient in Guinea was due to be discharged today and, if there are no more cases in the next six weeks, that country where the epidemic started, will also be Ebola free. The people are indeed rejoicing and trying to make sure that if Ebola ever raises its head again, they will be ready so they can avoid such a disaster hitting them again.

In Sierra Leone more than 4,000 people died and about as many again had the disease but recovered. For them life will continue to be hard. Many find that all their possessions including their homes have been destroyed so as to rid the community of the dreadful disease. Others like the nurse Pauline Cafferkey are suffering after effects such as stiff limbs and loss of sight. Clearly there is much to do to help these folk re-establish their lives.

It is hoped that John Spencer and someone else from the team, will be able to visit Sierra Leone in the New Year and discuss with the church leaders what sort of help they would like from us. Meanwhile, we have collected a great deal of equipment for the Nixon Hospital and the Training Centre at Kaihalun and this will be sent off in a container in the next few weeks.

We are grateful to God that all the staff of the Training Centre have been spared. With the easing of restrictions, students are beginning to return to classes. The Principal of the Centre, Sarah Moiwo has been in hospital for surgery and has also lost her elderly father in the last few weeks but she remains positive and confident in God's power to stand beside them in all the ups and downs.


