# Rev Ray Writes

Well it's that time of year again! The beginning of another liturgical year and the commencement of another annual cycle of accounts which retell the story of Jesus. Since ancient times, people have gathered around warm fires, in homes and in churches to listen again and again to stories of God, humans and of the relationships between them. This year we will tell the same stories with a particular focus on the one - Jesus of Nazareth. The two highlights of the Christian calendar will be celebrated in the seasons of Christmas and Easter.

But curiously enough, we don't start our church year with the birth narrative. The worldwide church has inserted this curious period of four weeks leading up to the celebration of Jesus' birth which it calls 'Advent'. What is it and why have it?

There are, of course, several answers to these question depending on where we are on our faith journey and what thread of faith me might be following this year. For me this year, Advent is about setting the scene and the context into which Jesus was born around 2000 years ago. Its purpose is to help us understand why God chose to take the form of a human being, chose to live a human life and why God gave that life up for the healing of all people. I suppose that's not so personal a view. Anyone (including you) could appropriate it and use it as a sort of map to navigate the period of Advent 2016. If you want to explore, come to Christ Church for the next few weeks and you'll see a whole series of themes which open up the Advent theme.

If you don't manage to get to Christ Church, here's a thumbnail sketch; Advent reminds us that our ancestors made a mess of things and cried out to God for help. God heard that cry and promised that when the time was right, he would send a Messiah to put things right. God isn't one for rushing and several millennia elapsed between the promise and its fulfilment. It's not that God is slow! It's that he can see the whole of space and time as if it is one great, big, panorama. He knew that Palestine around 2000 years ago was good. Given recent events we could be forgiven for thinking that a better time would be now and a better place might be the United States of America. But let's not go there!

Advent focuses on that time of waiting - that time when it is "not yet". Question is, what are we to do with that waiting time? This is a modern question because in today's world, waiting isn't something we do much of. Everything is instant! Our ancestors, on the other hand, expected to wait. So what do you do with this waiting time? You sit still and ponder. Ponder what in your life could this Jesus come and affect and possibly heal? What in your life needs loving better? Once you know what that might be, just ask him!

# The Mighty Mite

In October 1985, the late Roy Barnett, whilst preparing a sermon on the Widow's Mite, was moved by a report that 5 million children were dying each year through diarrhoea. On hearing of the development of a cure to save lives through Oral Rehydration Salts, costing 5p a sachet, he took up the first collection in his service. UNICEF took up the project and the Mite Scheme was born. Since then thousands of pounds have been raised simply through donations of these tiny coins week by week.

Our Mite Scheme box is on the table in the foyer. Every week it is brought up and dedicated with our freewill offering. Since starting the scheme at Christ Church, we have been able to send several hundreds of pounds to support this work.

By donating a mite or two when we come to worship, we can make a big difference to lives of children around the world.

## **Walk for November - The Longridge Circular**

This month, we decided to undertake a walk very close to home, quite literally, starting from Grange Towers. The walkers were treated to morning coffee in the conservatory and a boot room was provided at the front of the garage.

Leaving the estate, we crossed the playing field and worked our way across the adjacent farm to emerge at Preston Road and across to Alston Reservoirs, stopping briefly to have a look at the hides and the wildlife, or lack of it. From here we entered "Happy Alley", then on to Alston Grange and Higher College Farms. We were now heading in a Northerly direction, crossing the Ribchester road and

on to the very muddy track past Spade Mill Reservoirs, climbing steadily until, at the top, we had to decide whether to take the shorter option and on through Willows Park, or extend the walk via the Caravan Site. As the weather was good and the worst of the mud was probably behind us, we chose the latter and ended up at the collection of picnic tables kindly provided for us, or maybe not, but nobody chased us off!

We enjoyed a leisurely lunch stop, admiring the splendid views to the south and we were joined for a while by a friendly Robin. Now it was time for the second part of the walk, through the caravan park, from where we worked our way to the top of the Lords Quarry area, stopping to admire a beautiful newly built house with fabulous views to the North. A quick calculation confirmed that, if we all sold our respective homes, we could form a co-operative and live there. Maybe not.

Now it was all downhill, negotiating a tricky overgrown path to arrive at the old quarry railway and Billingtons Farm, down Lords Lane onto the Chipping road followed by a pleasant pathway to Inglewhite Road at Belmont Garage, after which we negotiated a short field path to emerge at Halfpenny Lane. The last part of the trek was down the very quiet Green Nook Lane and back to the start.

This popular walk has been done a number of times and its creation is a credit to the council. However, like everywhere else, there has been a deterioration in the maintenance of the facilities, particularly stiles. Many are in a dangerous state and more and more walks are becoming unsafe, particularly for elderly walkers. In recent times, we have had to abandon potentially good walks for safety reasons. However, despite the challenges, we all had an enjoyable adventure.
