# **Musings from the Manse**

Dear Friends,

One of the main difficulties faced by some churches today is the reality of an aging congregation and a lack of younger people willing to help out or take over key roles. It can be a real problem – not just when it comes to mission, but also to the nurture and growth of those within the faith community.

Sadly, at Christ Church, we are not immune to this. More and more we are finding that the things we want to do are made more difficult by a lack of those who are able to do them. So either we do less, or we concentrate on doing what we can, not by looking to one or two individuals, but by taking a few lessons from Geese.....!

'Lessons from Geese provides a perfect example of the importance of team work and how it can have a profound and powerful effect on any form of personal, business, or church endeavour. When we use these five principles, it helps to foster and encourage a level of passion and energy in ourselves, as well as those with whom we walk alongside in our journey of faith.

But, it is essential to remember that teamwork only happens when it is continually nurtured and encouraged.

# **Lesson I** - The Importance of Achieving Goals

As each goose flaps its wings it creates UPLIFT for the birds that follow. By flying in a 'V' formation the whole flock adds 71 % extra to the flying range.

#### Outcome

When we have a sense of community and focus, we create trust and can help each other to achieve our goals.

# **Lesson 2 -** The Importance of Team Work

When a goose falls out of formation it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of flying alone. It quickly moves back to take advantage of the lifting power of the birds in front.

#### Outcome

If we had as much sense as geese we would stay in formation with those headed where we want to go. We are willing to accept their help and give our help to others.

# Lesson 3 - The Importance of Sharing

When a goose tires of flying up front it drops back into formation and another goose flies to the point position.

#### Outcome

It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks. We should respect and protect each other's unique arrangement of skills, capabilities, talents and resources.

# Lesson 4 - The Importance of Empathy and Understanding

When a goose gets sick, two geese drop out of formation and follow it down to the ground to help and protect it.

#### Outcome

If we have as much sense as geese we will stand by each other in difficult times, as well as when we are strong.

# **Lesson 5** - The Importance of Encouragement

Geese flying in formation 'HONK' to encourage those up front to keep up with their speed.

#### Outcome

We need to make sure our honking is encouraging. In groups and teams where there is encouragement, production is much greater. 'Individual empowerment results from quality honking'

# **World Church News**

Having just watched the television programme 'Four Born Every Second', which compared giving birth in Britain, Cambodia, the USA and Sierra Leone, I was drawn to think about how difficult it would have been giving birth in Bethlehem 2000 plus years ago. Of course God had a plan for that birth in Bethlehem - as he does with every birth.

The infant mortality in Sierra Leone is among the worst in the world with 83 out of 1,000 babies dying during their first year and 495 out of every 100,000 mothers not surviving child birth. This is where I will be going in January along with nine others from Methodist churches around the Lancashire District. Some of the members of the Mission Team have a medical background and will be working for part of the time at a Methodist Hospital in Segbwema. In 2011 they



were able to help teach in the School of Nursing offering courses on caring for expectant mothers and their unborn babies.

Others members of the team will be travelling to Kailahun in the far

east of the country to continue the work started in 2006 where we were able to help the local community build and equip a skills training centre. The aim of the centre is to teach practical skills, such as tailoring and carpentry, to the young people, enabling them

to earn a living. After three years of operating as a centre, the staff are keen to expand the work. We will be helping to build more accommodation and share in the teaching.

Living, working and worshipping with the people of Sierra Leone is a challenging experience. It is incredible to see the way they live out their faith in such difficult circumstances, totally relying on God's provision for their daily lives. By the time you read this they will have elected a new President and Members of Parliament and will be anticipating a future that is brighter.

As we enter the season of Advent the challenge is are we relying on God's provision and prepared to welcome Christ again?

# **Connexion Zone @ Christ Church**

For some time now, Connexion Zone has been an initiative run by John Spencer, myself, and a handful of volunteers. It grew from the 'Pram Service' we hosted, with nursery and reception children from Barnacre Road School and the 2toSchool Playgroup which meets on our premises – and became 'Connexion Zone' in order to develop it into a programme of outreach to children in the community.

As we are all aware, the lack of children and young people in our Sunday morning worship is a cause of sadness and concern – but it is not one that we face alone.

The amount of choice that children and families face these days is enormous – sports and recreational activities, family time, all make demands on what little free time people have – and often coming to the traditional Sunday morning worship is simply not a priority for many.

As a church, it means that we must adapt in how we 'do church' – and the once a month Sunday afternoon Connexion Zone – is an attempt to respond to this.

The response, up to now, to this 'Second Sunday' initiative has been small but positive — but we've all had a great time exploring the 'Story', 'Song', 'Games', 'Craft', and 'Picnic' Zones. Currently we are using material from the BBC 'Friends and Heroes' series — but this may change and develop as time goes by.

What we need from our faith community and beyond, is the willingness to participate, to get involved – both physically, and by seeking God's will for this venture through prayer and reflection. We also need you to spread the word – to encourage families to come along – to make the 'Connexion'.

We still host the half-term, Wednesday morning Connexion Zone – and for this we do need those willing to come along and help serve refreshments to the children, teachers and parents who attend, and simply be the 'face' of Christ Church.

The next editions of 'Connexion Zone' will be on Sunday 9<sup>th</sup> December at 3pm (helpers need to be there by 2.30, please), and Wednesday 12<sup>th</sup> December at 10am (helpers by 9.30, please). Why not put the dates in your diary!

My thanks go to those who have already helped to get this venture off the ground – my hope is that it will continue to grow and develop as we seek to 'Live for Christ, at the heart of the Community'

# Walk For September - Chorley Circular

A decade ago, the local council organized a good, well signed route around Chorley, but the information is now somewhat out of date, creating some navigational challenges in places.

Starting from a lay-by on the A6, our little party quickly joined the Leeds & Liverpool Canal and headed north, enjoying good walking weather, warm and sunny. After half a mile, we left the canal, walked through woods to the A6, which we crossed to enter Duxbury Park and enjoyed a pleasant stroll through Duxbury woods. Eventually, we left the woods and climbed a steep banking and followed a series of paths to emerge at the Yarrow Valley Country Park and our lunch stop on a seat overlooking the lake. Considering that this area used to be a large dye works, the transformation to a nature reserve is remarkable.

Lunch over, we now headed through woods and fields to emerge at a disused sand quarry, then along a lane to the main road and in to Astley Park, where we decided to stop for a coffee at the café. We must be getting old!

Leaving the park, we had now to negotiate the back streets of Chorley, the council map proving to be quite useful here. After this complicated section of the walk, we crossed the M 61 and arrived at the canal once more.

The last part of the walk was now a quite long stretch of the canal, this time heading south. The tow-path was very busy with families out walking, dog walkers and courteous cyclists. Many canal boats were out, their owners giving us a cheery wave as they passed. The twitchers in our party said that the walk had produced a satisfying number of species.

We all thoroughly enjoyed this varied walk, but the council need to update the information and signage so that inexperienced and local walkers can share the delights of the best that Chorley can offer.

Leaving the village, we turned into Snowhill lane and the long slog over the M6 and up to the start of the climb over Nicky Nook Fell. The path up the fell is quite steep, but we soon made the top and the famous trig. point. The early rain had now stopped and we were able to have our photograph taken in the pleasant sunshine.

Now, it was down the fell to Grize Dale, followed by a stroll along this lovely path as far as the head of Grizedale Reservoir, from where we entered pleasant woodland following Grizedale Brook to our lunch stop at Grizedale Bridge. The second part of our walk started with a section of road walking as far as Calder Side, where our party of six turned into a good track which took us to the famous radio masts that can be seen for miles around. The path now headed west and opened up to a fabulous broad view over the Irish Sea and Morecambe Bay.

The final part of the walk was a steady descent, through farmyards and green lanes, with Pheasants fluttering about, until we arrived at the truly awful Woodacre pasture which had to be crossed. We had to negotiate continuous, ankle deep mud for a quarter of a mile. The Dear Leader came in for some stick from his loyal followers, but he is thick skinned. And what is a Pleb. anyway?

At last we left this nightmare and climbed a stile on to a wooded banking and back down to Grizedale, which we crossed and walked up the embankment opposite, up to Higher Lane followed by the last field and on to Tithe Barn Lane which led us back to Scorton.

Despite the ground conditions, which have been a problem all year, this turned out to be a good walk which we all enjoyed.

# **Walk For November - Martin Mere**

The Martin Mere Wetland Centre, situated between Preston and Southport, is a well-known and splendid place for bird watching and a good location to start our walk.

Before stating, we had a look around. The centre attracts many species of bird, particularly vast numbers of Pink Footed Geese and Whooper Swans, together with Bewick Swans, Harriers, Bullfinches, Common Crane and many others.

The first part of the walk took us over a number of well drained fields with easy walking. This part of Lancashire is very flat! The fields eventually gave way to quiet country lanes. We passed a charming country pub and restored farmhouses and finally came to the Leeds and Liverpool Canal, following the tow path for a couple of miles.

Our lunch stop was by a swing bridge, sat facing the warm sun and watching the various Narrow Boats pass by. After lunch, on our way again, we came to a terrace of cottages with their pretty front gardens forming the canal bank.

Eventually, we arrived at Burscough, a communications centre for road, rail and canal. In the centre of the town, we had a look at the new development, with a central square surrounded by shops, a café and, unlike Longridge, a place to spend a penny. As we headed out of Burscough, we could see the large industrial estate which was previously a wartime Fleet Air Arm training airfield. (HMS Ringtail). The old hangars and control tower are still there.

We now started our return by way of a marked footpath to Martin Mere and passed some enormous fields with the farm machinery equally gargantuan. Our route now took us along fields and farm tracks, a little muddy in places, then along a lane and back to the

start. Our return coincided with the afternoon feeding at the centre and what an impressive sight with thousands of large birds noisily swooping down to grab their feed. Apparently, many birds have arrived early this year due to very cold conditions in Northern Europe.

Many thanks again to Bill, from our Bolton contingent, for organising this interesting walk and adding to the variety of the walks that we enjoy.

The classes are very small - depending on the needs of each child – much use is made of Visual Aids, cards for example matching picture to the words.

Then off on our travels again - this time with Mel Watson and her husband going by air to Perth, Western Australia – travelling North to the coast. From there they hired a car. At one of their one night stops they were told it would be impossible to get to their next port of call because of flooding. However Mel went to the police station

where a very helpful policeman routed them on more minor roads and though some were flooded they got to their destination and continued on their journey, visiting Norman's brother, before travelling north again and returning home.

On November 12th we were off again, this time to visit the Great Wall of China with Pat Ascroft. The company had arranged a 7 day walk along the wall, walking some days for 11 hours: they had Chinese Ladies who helped them scramble up very steep steps, carrying rucksacks etc. Sleeping arrangements were very primitive – a hole in the floor, in the room where they slept, for a toilet. Pat has done a number of these treks for MENCAP. We meet on November 26th to hear about Pilates – if there are exercises – having tried these – I think I'll be a spectator! Our usual Christmas meal is on December 10th.


The Church Council/Meeting for March has been changed to Sunday March 17<sup>th</sup> following the morning service.
