## **Rev Ray Writes**

Those of you who were regular users of public transport, when the bus and rail network were much bigger, may remember that clarion call from conductors and drivers "All change!" Back in 2017 the Circuit Meeting collectively shouted that same clarion call to the whole of the circuit as we started to grapple with the issue of making ends meet with presbyterial coverage of the Methodist Churches and Ecumenical Partnerships in the circuit.

Although Christ Church is away from Preston City, it is not being left untouched by the changes that are coming down the track. There have already been changes to our worship patterns and we have seen a shift in the way we are church. It seems to be dawning on people that the "build it and they will come" idea has not borne fruit in a number of places in the circuit where there has been investment. The idea that "they" will come to "us" doesn't have much currency.

And yet, we see the green shoots of mission in Christ Church with the introduction of Round the Table, where young mothers and their children are finding a place of refuge, companionship and spiritual development. It's in its infancy but it is very very exciting. Like a spilled liquid seeping across a surface, the Kingdom of God is working its way through parts of Longridge.

This is also a time of personal change for me. As most of you know, we are having a cabinet reshuffle in the Preston Ribble Circuit and I shall be moving out of ministry at Christ Church on the 31st August. In fact this is the last article I shall be writing for the Messenger. The last missive was also the last article I wrote for the Longridge News' Voice of the Church. Here it is in case you didn't see it;

Change is something that has been happening since the time God's Spirit "brooded" over the "waters" and brought creation into being. That

creation has been evolving over time and change is no stranger to the universe. The question is, what to make of change. The Book of Ecclesiastes contains a poem which articulates a sense of timeliness for everything; laughing and crying, birthing and dying, tearing and mending, uprooting and planting. The book chronicles an attempt to discover whether everything is fated or we can effect change. The author gives three pieces of advice for successful living which I would like to offer as a parting gift;

Firstly, accept what God has provided and make the most of it. It is no coincidence that people who successfully manage change, even change for the worse, are those who can make the most of their current circumstances. Admittedly this is easier for them for whom the glass is always half full and less so for them for whom it is always half empty!

Secondly, by all means be curious about life and its mysteries, but don't use up your life in the pursuit of unravelling those mysteries unless that is a life-giving activity for you. Those of us who are content with sitting with a question without necessarily needing an answer may well prove to be the more successful managers of change.

Thirdly, make wise decisions. Well that's easier said than done! Wisdom doesn't exactly come pre-loaded into our human brains does it! No it doesn't, but you don't have to possess it. You can borrow it from others - if you have the humility to admit you need help!

I have enjoyed ministering in Longridge and I wish I had had fewer churches so I could have spent more time locally. The Christ Church Annual Church Meeting takes place after morning service on Sunday 3rd June about I2.30pm when the members will have an opportunity to give feedback on my ministry over the last few years in the hope that we can learn lessons for the future. I hope you will come and join in.

Finally, I pray that the Holy Spirit of Jesus, of God, will light your path as you continue to make a difference in the burgeoning town of Longridge.

## More from 'Round the Table'

Our joint initiative with Inglewhite Church continues to grow and flourish. Since the beginning of this year we have been meeting once a fortnight. The format of sessions, where we meet on Thursday afternoons to share a simple meal and to play and socialise is now becoming well established, as the families who join us feel increasingly 'at home' with our buildings and feel comfortable to meet with one another in this way. We are continuing to welcome new families (and 2 new babies!) as news of Round the Table spreads by word of mouth.

The group is growing spiritually as well. In our ten minute 'Table Talk' sessions we have been exploring the difficulties and the benefits of finding time for God during what is, for many, a busy and pressurised daily life. The families we work with have expressed a clear need and a desire to spend some time together in informal worship. Our minister, Ray has led one calm and reflective Sunday evening service with music provided by Lucy and Andy Foot from Inglewhite. We continue to explore different timings to try and find a format that will best accommodate the demands and time pressures of running a young family.

Our support group meets on Wednesday evenings at Claire Tuffin's house for fellowship, bible study, prayer - and sometimes a bit of last minute planning! It is our earnest hope that other members of 'Round the Table' will be able to join us then, but so far that has not been realised. We have recently completed foundation training in safeguarding for children young people and vulnerable adults.

We continue to be challenged and stretched by the demands of this venture and the needs within our community. We are reaching out to the other churches in Longridge to see whether we can put 'Round the Table' on a truly ecumenical footing. However this works out we continue to struggle ourselves with day to day pressures and the growing demands of this project. But it's worth it. If you feel you could support us in prayer and in practice, please talk to one of us.

## Walk for February - Around Wheelton

Our meeting point was Dark Lane, just North of Chorley and we were quickly up onto the canal and walking in snow with the canal frozen, but I wouldn't want to skate on it! Winters aren't what they were. The writer recalled riding our bikes on the ice from Preston, along the Lancaster canal to Catforth and back, with our front tyres removed for extra control.

We were walking along the Walton Summit Link, which connects the Leeds and Liverpool Canal to the Lancaster Canal. The original plan was to incorporate a vast viaduct over the Ribble valley, and what an impressive feature that would have been, but it wasn't to be, and a tramway was used instead.

Having left the link, we were now on the Leeds and Liverpool canal and walking NE towards Higher Wheelton in a beautiful snowy landscape, passing a number of moored canal boats, one or two being very "High end", and on to the village, where we left the canal and entered the village and our lunch stop in the memorial garden.

Lunch over, we had to decide on the next part of the walk. The route took us across fields, but the ground conditions were still terrible, so we opted to follow the main road, which was fairly quiet, down to the next village of Wheelton, and as we are now an aging

walking group, we had to stop at a local café for refreshments and a warm up.

From Wheelton, we started the last leg of the walk back to the canal via the "Top Lock", and Dark Lane.

## Walk for March - Garstang And Churchtown

For the March walk, we decided on a circuit to the south of Garstang that could be described as another, "Three Waters", as, at various times, we followed the Lancaster Canal and the rivers Calder and Wyre.

Our meeting point was the main car park by the River Wyre, from where we set off through Garstang to join the canal and head in a southerly direction on a good path, soon passing the large basin that is now noted for its pubs and restaurants and also having a good look at the various types of canal craft as we passed. Having crossed over another of John Rennie's splendid aqueducts, the remains of Greenhalgh Castle came into view, built by the Earl of Derby in 1490 and destroyed by the Roundheads during the Civil War.

Eventually, we arrived at bridge 53 and our exit point, where we entered a quiet lane for a while before joining a field on a path that, after a couple of fields joined the River Calder and took us to our lunch stop at the Catteral sports centre and village hall and a convenient shelter. After our, "Butty stop", we followed the Calder

for a while until it joined the Wyre and took us to the A6. What a busy road this now is. It took us quite a while to safely cross to a small collection of old houses and a street that at one time was the old main road.

We were now following the Wyre to the south and ended up at a suspension bridge that took us into the pretty little village of Churchtown and the attractive St. Helens Church. Having crossed another busy main road we followed a number of good farm tracks, passing the enormous wind generator, re-crossed the A6 and entered the path back to the canal. From here, we re-traced our steps to the car park, but not before stopping at Booths for coffee and scones, as we do these days!

Altogether this proved to be a varied and interesting seven-mile walk. The weather was kind to us, (Apart from the biting north wind), and, surprisingly, the numerous fields that we traversed were reasonably dry. Let us hope for a long dry summer!

## Walk for April - The Tolkien Trail

As the countryside is now drying out, we decided to try our luck with this local and very popular walk that gave us many options thanks to the considerable number of decent paths in the area.

When we arrived at the car park at Hurst Green, we were surprised at the number of cars parked there. It appeared that two other walking groups were also starting at the same time, one of them tackling our walk in the opposite direction.

From the village, we headed across fields towards Stonyhurst College, the domed turrets quickly appearing in the distance and we soon arrived at the playing fields, followed by the observatories and a good track out of the grounds and across into fields. Later, we crossed a stile and entered Over Hacking Wood and a long, very steep flight of steps. Why would you do this walk the other way round? We were now at the River Hodder and the next challenge was a climb up to the very imposing Hodder Place, built in 1780 for a mill owner. Interestingly, there is no trace of the mill, on the Hodder that created the wealth.

After a pleasant riverside walk, we arrived at the main road and stopped for the usual photos of Cromwell's Bridge and on, up the road and across fields towards Winckley Hall Farm. We noticed that there had been a good crop of lambs this spring and they seemed to be everywhere. By now we were back at the river again and approaching our beautiful lunch stop. However, the other walking group were approaching from the opposite direction with the same idea, so the race was on. We won! The leadership were assigned the fisherman's hut, with its folding table and the other ranks took possession of the seat. The Blackburn group placed themselves on

the steps. However, we all had a pleasant break, watching the wildlife and a lone fisherman in the middle of the river.

The other group informed us that the river route back was in good shape, but the field at the very end, behind the Shireburn Arms Hotel was awful, with unavoidable deep mud, so a decision was made to return via a different route, taking the lane up to the main road, resting at the scenic 'bus shelter with its excellent vista of Pendle and onwards up the quiet lane and back to Stonyhurst. We completed the walk along the impressive and very long driveway and back to Hurst green.

This was one of our, "Bread and Butter", walks and always pleasant. The weather was superb with clear views in all directions. And the Blackburn group? They didn't appear before we left. Perhaps they were still struggling up the steps!


