Walk for May - Marles Wood – Dinckley

This month, we decided to embark on a fairly local walk and one that is quite scenic. The weather was very much on our side and the walking conditions looked good.

The start of the walk was Marles Wood car park, from where we did a little road walking before entering a series of fields and the first of many stiles. Milo the dog has now mastered the techniques of stile crossing and is quite an expert. Eventually, we arrived at a farm and on to the busy A59 at Copster Green.

After a little road walking, we turned off down a drive towards Copster Hall and through a field where some sheep ran away from us, except one large ram that decided to walk ahead to a small farm where the lady farmer informed us that the beast was her late husband's pet and was very independent and bossy. After the farm, we descended to a wooden bridge across a stream, followed by a climb up to a stile and on through Dinckley Grange to a quiet lane. A feature of this walk was the very long grass that we encountered everywhere and made an easy walk quite strenuous.

We crossed the lane and entered another drive up to a big house and into more fields and the highest part of the walk. Here, we stopped to admire the fabulous view, with the full extent of Longridge Fell ahead and Pendle to the right. We were now heading for Aspinalls Farm, which meant passing through a pasture with a herd of very frisky cattle in it. I didn't like the idea of crossing this field, with or without a dog, so we managed to find another way along the side of the farm, where we found a number of footballs hidden in the long grass. Of course, we had to indulge in a little game of Finney and Lofthouse? Now, we were heading downhill to the River Ribble and the Dinckley Ferry Footbridge. This bridge was destroyed in the floods a while ago and has recently been rebuilt, much higher and stronger and what a splendid job they have made of it! We had lunch by the bridge and then started the last part of the walk, following a beautiful stretch of the river back to Marles Wood.

This turned out to be a beautiful walk, helped by the splendid weather and good conditions underfoot. However, next time we will make sure that the farmer has cut the grass in the fields first!

Walk for June - Around Whalley

For our walk this month, we decided to explore the countryside to the south of Whalley. This is an area that we hadn't visited before, so we were quite looking forward to a scenic and varied landscape dominated by the River Calder.

Our starting point was the car park at Spring Wood, from where we entered the splendid grounds of Whalley Golf Club, carefully crossing the fairways to the club house and on to a quiet lane for a short stretch and then into the fields towards the interesting Read Old Bridge which carries the lane over Sabden Brook. From here, it was back into the fields, following the line of a wood into Read Park with splendid views across to Darwen Tower and Winter Hill. Eventually, we arrived at the drive to Read Hall, but as we weren't invited to coffee with Mr. Big, we turned right, down to the A671. This, the Burnley road, was extremely busy in both directions and we were very glad to be safely across it and walking down a pleasant bridleway and on through a popular garden centre towards another busy road, the A680 Accrington road.

The next stage of the walk was dominated by the lovely River Calder. We joined a path heading west and popular with dog walkers and after half a mile, we found a pretty spot by the river for a leisurely lunch. From here, the navigation got a little complex, but we left the river and climbed a steep embankment, following the edge of a wood on a series of indifferent paths. However, we were fortunate to encounter two walking groups coming in the opposite direction who managed to point us the right way. After quite a long climb, we arrived at a small hamlet of beautifully restored farmhouses, one in particular having a massive upper lounge window overlooking the valley and river. Yes, I could live there!

Now, Whalley came into view, but first we had to walk down one of the steepest country lanes ever encountered. Yes, we were certainly walking the right way round! When we got to King Street, a little rest was enjoyed at the bus station before completing the walk by turning into Brooks's Lane and picking up a footpath back up to Spring Wood, passing under the by-pass.

This walk turned out to be a bit of a navigational challenge in places. However, the route was quite scenic all the way and we were blessed with splendid weather, quite surprising considering how bad a week it was.

The North West Air Ambulance Charity's helicopters fly 365 days a year, with the doctors and paramedics on board providing rapid treatment and hospital transfers to patients across the entire North West region each year – an area covering 5,500 square miles and 8 million people. Since it launched in 1999, the charity has flown more than 17,000 missions across the region, with the ambulance called out an average of five times a day, rising to ten in summer. Just as many critically injured patients would not survive without the service that the charity provides, the North West Air Ambulance would not be here without the support of its community of fundraisers and partners. The charity is completely reliant on public and corporate donations, We don't receive government or NHS funding and so are reliant on our volunteers and supporters to help keep our lifesaving helicopters in the sky. To keep the North West's Air Ambulance Charity helicopters operational and helping to save lives, needing to



raise over $\pounds 9.5$ million a year to support its lifesaving service.

Northwest air ambulance charity shop in Longridge are currently looking for retail volunteers to help, we also have opportunities all over the North West region. We don't ask for any specific commitment in

order to help keep volunteering as accessible as possible, but many of our volunteers help out for around half a day a week. From sorting donations and working on the till to creating enticing window displays, there are lots of ways to get involved in our shops - all of which help to raise vital funds which save lives across the region every day. The walk continued along the river with plenty of wildlife to enjoy, followed by a section where we went inland for a while before returning and as we got closer to Clitheroe, the number of dog walkers became quite numerous.

Soon, we found a pleasant seat to enjoy our late lunch, where we spent some time enjoying the beautiful weather and watching the wildlife. By now the dog walkers were returning and most of them stopped for a chat. We learned quite a lot about Clitheroe and local politics but not a mention of B----t. We were now back at the Edisford Bridge area and needed to find our way back to the car park via a number of local tracks.

Despite the dodgy start, this turned out to be a good walk, mostly following a splendid section of the Ribble. If we had brought our cossies, we could have finished off with a swim in the pool!


